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
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

Dear G. Rashmi,

A Very Happy & Wonderful New Year - 2020 to you and all the members of Vasavya Mahila Mandali!

We are in the context of the world celebration of the 150th Birth Anniversary of Mahatma Gandhi and his wife Kasturba Gandhi. Mahatma Gandhi defined his life as his experiments with truth. In her journey with her husband, Kasturba experienced, understood and accepted the truth of Gandhi's philosophy. Her understanding of Gandhi's philosophy was so powerful that Gandhi said of Kasturba "I learnt the lesson of non-violence from my wife".

We are together in our homage to Mahatma Gandhi and Kasturba. Representing Matrishakti Kasturba was the greatest strength of Mahatma Gandhi. Matrishakti is the eternal flow of truth love and courage that represents the greatest force of creation - the flow of love and strength of a mother. Conscience is a truth that is one's own supreme reality. This truth leads us to the search of the unknown in the cosmic and beyond. Let us strengthen our soul so that the vibrations of our silence and our action can give the message of love and friendship in harmony with all life and environment.

It is our responsibility today to earn the right to future, to work towards this right to a future, where the human mind is without violence and the environment is without pollution.

The shortest way to the future of our dreams can be achieved only by giving the right education and examples set by us for the children and the youth of the country. The life of every human being is based on the experiences of childhood. The memory of experiences of childhood is never forgotten by any human being. Let us not forget that most terrorists and violent people have faced the brutal childhood. We must give the right education and set examples of compassion and responsibility to our children and the youth.

The best gift to a child is a beautiful memory for his and her future.

There is the fearlessness of a terrorist and there is fearlessness of a person who inspires love and trust. For a non-violent struggle for human right and justice, the fearlessness should inspire trust and love. We have examples of person who have made this possible - Mahatma Gandhi, Nelson Mandela, Martin Luther King, Mother Teresa and many others known and unknown.

A woman's role for this future is pivotal. A woman will have to be a pilot and a navigator to lead us towards the future of our dreams. I say "A woman"; because a woman has an innate, natural and spiritual energy to be a multitasker much more than a man. A woman has the intellectual and spiritual strength to face diverse and serious challenges in the same time.

In this journey of celebration of the 150th birth anniversary of Mahatma Gandhi and Kasturba Gandhi, we are together in our homage to the greatest spiritual and creative flows of man and nature, of the past and present that have kept the spark of eternal love still glowing in each one of us. It is to this flame that we offer our prayers.

Dear VMM Family,

Congratulations to VMM on 50 remarkable years of serving children and families in need and providing them with real skills to enable them to lead full and productive lives. Your program is a model for others to follow – not only in India but worldwide.

It was an honor for the Abbott Fund to be a VMM donor for ten wonderful years. I am proud that our grant support of more than \$750,000 helped VMM reach tens of thousands of children and families affected by HIV/AIDS and with other challenges. I was especially pleased with VMM's empowering children, families, and communities to become fully engaged in their programs – from support groups to the Youth Centre (sheltering and gaining employment for street youth) to mobile health programs.

I have many fond recollections of VMM and I will share just a few of them.

My first visit to VMM in early 2001 included a walk down to the nearby river where hundreds of street children were swimming and bathing. When they saw Rashmi everything stopped for a few seconds and then the children rushed to greet her and thank her for her visit. It became immediately clear how these children were not simply using services provided by VMM but were part of the larger VMM family.

When we came back to VMM from the visit to the river I learned about the "savings account program" from several of these same street children. They may save only a rupee or two a week but it became clear after a few minutes that this program was not just about how much money they could save. Instead, it was about helping the children to actually change their mindset about not simply focus on where they were going to sleep that night or get their next meal but also to start thinking about tomorrow - talking about what they wanted to do with their savings from going back to school, to starting a business, to helping others – all planning for their own futures – just the result that VMM intended.

For many years VMM, under Keerthi's guidance, ran a program called Picturing Hope where children learned how to shoot photos and then take pictures of their friends, schools, families and anything else that interested them. They would then have these pictures developed and keep written journals about them. This program taught some practical skills and opened the door for many children to tell their stories for the first time - often describing struggles as well as how hope had prevailed. This program was so successful that exhibits were done in Delhi, New York, and Chicago — all well received.

I look forward to the VMM story being told for many years to come - a story of accomplishment, inspiration and hope. I am so grateful to have been a part of this incredible program. Thank you and all the best for the next 50 years!



VASAVYA MAHILA MANDALI WOMEN LED EMPOWERMENT HALF A CENTURY JOURNEY

Chronicles of VMM- The beginnings

The Genesis of Vasavya Mahila Mandali (VMM) was the result of the life experiences and lessons learned from communities of women. Mrs. Chennupati Vidya, Founder President of VMM experienced the colonial rule in India and its rigidity during the freedom struggle when her parents Gora and Saraswathi Gora along with Vidya's elder sister and brother (Manorama and Lavanam) were arrested and kept in jail, leaving behind the young children alone at home in Mudunuru village in Krishna district, Andhra Pradesh in 1942. Very young children were exposed to live with the support of villagers. British police broke the pots of food prepared by children and tried to create terror. Vidya was then just 8 years old and her elder sister Mythri 10 years. But the children stood their ground and faced the police. That was the time the inequalities in communities were felt by Vidya and Mythri. After independence Vidya stayed at Gandhiji's Sevagram ashram from 1948-1949 and was trained in village development and constructive social work. She realised the gender discrimination in society, illiteracy of women along with contemporary problems faced by women like child marriages, young widowhood and violence against women. These issues were identified by her but the women accepted the situation as their destiny or 'karma' and society just taking these as tradition. "The cultural traditions plaguing women need to be addressed by changing the women first by letting their voices heard." thought Vidya. The herculean task of implementing this idea was challenged by

- Social perceptions about women
- Women treated as second rate citizens
- Women accepting these cultural norms

In 1950, Vidya married Chennupati Seshagiri Rao, a follower of Gora. He with his progressive thoughts that were different from the then social norms, encouraged Vidya's education. So she started with Matriculation (equivalent to10th standard) and completed Bachelor degree with the help of her father Gora. The support Vidya got from her mother in-law Rangamma was incredible by taking care of household maintenance and wishing to see her daughter in-law educated. Vidya was the first graduate woman from that village in those days of 1960s. In 1967, Vidya was nominated as co-opted woman member of Gollapudi Panchayath and visited all villages of the panchayath and assessed the problems faced by women and families. Then after noticing her performance in the village local self-government, Vidya was nominated as

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member of Zilla Parishad for the district and got better opportunity to work at a larger platform in the total district. She initiated 27 Mahila Mandals in interior villages to have a platform for women to know and address their issues. She used her experiences and became the voice of women.

She and her sister Mythri discussed with their father Gora and the idea of Vasavya Mahila Mandali (VMM) was born. Gora named it VA SA VYA, an anagram in Telugu for

VA - VASTAVIKATA – Reality,

SA – SANGHDRUSTI - Social consciousness,

VYA - VYAKTITVAM - Individuality



Reality with social consciousness in developing individuality is the core value of VMM. Gandhian thought of truth, nonviolence, self-reliance and Gora's humanism and scientific temperament are the core basis for VMM's values, philosophies and actions.

This idea was supported monetarily and morally by Chennupati Seshagiri Rao. The idea of likeminded women to come together to form an executive and general body in 1960s was a difficult task and needed the permission of their spouses as women were not allowed to go outside of house. After a long search, nine able women gathered to work for women development in 1969. The Founder Executive Committee of VMM was,

- 1. Chennupati Vidya, Founder President. Social activist
- 2. Dr. Yarlagadda Seetha Ratnam, Vice President. Medical doctor
- 3. N. Lakshmi Chari, Secretary. Social activist
- 4. Jonnalagadda Mythri, Treasurer. Social Psychologist
- 5. Leela Ram Murthy, Member. Social worker
- 6. Kommareddy Mani, Member. Social worker
- 7. Goparaju Hemalatha Lavanam, Member. Social activist
- 8. Praphulla Patel, Member. Social worker
- 9. Borra Narayanamma, Member. Social worker





Women were lacking a support system for individual development and were unaware of their capabilities. VMM aimed at becoming the support mechanism for women and their families who were dormant, illiterate, ignorant, superstitious etc. VMM became a platform for women to interact and voice their ideas and skills.

In International women's year 1975, 400 new Mahila Mandals were registered. These Mahila Mandals formed into "Krishna District Federation of Mahila Mandals" (Krishna Zilla Mahila Mandals Samakhya).

The then Chief Minister Jalagam Vengala Rao started "The state federation of Mahila Mandals". The President and Secretary of 400 Mahila Mandals were representatives in the state federation. The women's finance corporation used to extend financial assistance to this state federation of Mandals for income generation programmes. In this international women's year to improve the women empowerment the state government had distributed loans to women.

From 1969 to 1974 VMM worked as an informal organization with communities. Work was given priority over registration. Later VMM registered under the Indian Societies act 1860, on 8th December 1975. The registration was executed at the District Administrative Centre, Machilipatnam. Mrs. Surydevara Rajyalakshmamma, M.L.A of Jaggayyapeta constituency and Mrs. Surydevara Annapuramma, Vice President, Zilla Parishad signed as witnesses to the registration.

Since then the activities had taken a new dimension with need based and community driven interventions to bring change in the society, particularly to improve the status of women.

In1980 Vidya's entry into the Indian Parliament is yet another landmark in the quest for "Platform for women's voices". This motivated many women to step up into the political arena. Community level women's issues such as women's education, health and safety were brought into the Parliament.

1985 was another milestone for VMM as Chennupati Vidya and Seshagiri Rao donated 1180 square yards of their land to VMM in the heart of Vijayawada. This became the center for working women's hostel, children's home, women's home and the administrative workplace of VMM and the hub for women to meet, discuss and plan for action, review and redesign.

In 1990s, District Administration provided two acres of land in Vemavaram village which is 18 kilometers from Vijayawada, for the various women and child centered activities.

In 2000, a shelter for street youth was constructed with the support of ABBOTT STEP FORWARD program in Jawahar Autonagar, Vijayawada. Government, corporate sector, philanthropists and people from the community helped VMM in the success of this program.





In the 50 years journey of VMM, as needs of the communities changed, the approach of the programs were tailored for the people accordingly.

Vision in 1969: To promote comprehensive social economic, political development of women and children especially in vulnerable situations, thereby empowering communities in AP to improve their quality of life and build a better civil society in India.

Vision in 2019: Empowering women, children and families by increasing happiness and ensuring a sustainable society with human values.

It is imperative that civil societies need to revise their by-laws to suit the present needs of the community and amend by informing the Government. VMM as a civil society is dynamic in the fact that the by-laws were changed 13 times to meet the "at time" needs of the community.

Dynamic changes in VMM in the past five decades:

- An Informal organisation to registered organisation.
- Welfare to empowerment
- Gender sensitive to gender inclusive
- Part time to full time employees with policies and systems.
- Hand written accounts to computerized accountancy management
- Writing letter / telegram to mailing through internet
- Photo albums to Google library
- Hard files to soft files
- Newsletter to social media
- Community outreach through group meeting to usage of Information, Communication Technology (ICT)
- Financial transactions from cash to bank / online transfers
- Files racks to hard discs
- Trunk calls to Skype

VMM built a strong team to continue its legacy and its second generation spearheading the organization is committed, passionate and innovative.

VMM always worked with Humanistic Professionalism. Vidya always said, "If professionalism neglects humanistic approach, then work from a humanistic angle rather than a professional angle".



Chronicles of VMM- Family Health

Anaemia as a major health issue

In 1960s the major health issue of women was anaemia and lack of knowledge on family planning. Superstitions on health and nutrition were prevailing. To change the attitudes of women and families was challenging as women did not have a voice in families or society due to patriarchy. To address anaemia among women, VMM encouraged them to grow green leafy vegetables in their backyard and the excess can be shared/sold. The impact was seen on their health and improved energy. Superstitions on health and food were dealt by the then VMM Vice President, Dr. Y. Sitaratnam, a gynaecologist. She gave knowledge on spacing and other methods of family planning. Getting contraceptive pills was not possible for women in those days as the pills were not available freely. Accessibility of Primary Health Centers was not easy as the centers were few and far apart. So VMM concentrated on prevention through improving nutrition in economic way like kitchen gardens and also nutrition demonstrations with locally available low cost food items. Women used to share the techniques to improve the food they make every day for better health. Millets having Iron and Calcium like Ragi were promoted and these millets were easily available and affordable even for families below the poverty line. In 1960s and 1970s, women were totally dependent on men for getting simple things and so making small changes in food habits was very difficult and lot of resistance was observed but they tried to change with tenacity.

The anaemia among men and women was a major problem during the HIV rampant period in early 2000s and the nutrition demonstrations with millets were reintroduced in the communities. Women and men were trained in making use of millets with high Iron and Calcium and improving their health and reducing morbidity. The HIV positive women became ambassadors of nutrition and went to colleges and schools to demonstrate and share their experiences of improved health with the use of simple ingredients. Andhra Pradesh State AIDS Control Society also recognized VMM's work. Kitchen gardens in pots for urban areas were encouraged.

Pre-school children health

The health of preschool children through crèche, Balwadis and Anganwadis in the rural and urban slums was taken up with regular health checkups and providing nutritious food and educating mothers on the importance of nutrition and hygiene. Many children used to have diarrhea and scabies. In due course they were cured of their illness. The children who came with many diseases to the centers became healthy and the mothers noticed the change in the children and were motivated to maintain hygiene.





Polio corrective surgeries

One boy with Polio from Anganwadi inspired us to plan Polio corrective surgeries as he was unable to walk. He used to come to the center crawling on his hands and legs. In those days, Polio was prevalent as vaccination was not accepted by families. In one medical camp, Dr. Samaram saw his enthusiasm and examined him. A corrective surgery to his legs was done that enabled him to walk on his legs and to do his own work. VMM had conducted nearly 150 operations for polio affected people and made them live their lives well. Dr. Maru, Executive member of VMM, and the philanthropic doctors of Vijayawada, supported VMM in this project. Vijayawada Municipal Corporation financially supported this programme.VMM promoted Polio vaccination vigorously to prevent Polio. All mothers associated with VMM were given knowledge on the importance of Polio vaccine and they became ambassadors for the cause of prevention of polio. In continuation, the students of Multi-Purpose Health workers training Institute were involved in polio drops awareness in Vijayawada.

Hospital for small family norm

A well-equipped hospital in Vijayawada rural mandal was not available for women to get family planning operations and also antenatal checkups and vaccinations. So Hospital for small family norm was initiated from 1994 to 2000, supported by Government of India, Ministry of Health and district health administration. This hospital was equipped with operation theatre, one doctor, two nurses and ten beds. The main purpose of this project was to educate rural population about the benefits of small families. The family planning operations; vasectomy or tubectomy were performed in the hospital along with regular antenatal and postnatal checkups, immunisation and knowledge building on health issues. Rotary and Lions clubs distributed incentives to the persons undergoing family planning operations. 2500 people underwent family planning operations during this time (per year about 500). Out of 2500 operations, only 10 men came forward for vasectomy operation. This speaks the adaptability of women to the changing society. Dr. Deeksha, Medical Director, VMM personally counseled men to get vasectomy done and encouraged women towards antenatal and postnatal genital hygiene and breast feeding. Balanced nutrition was encouraged and healthy babies were delivered. District health department recognized this facility as the best for women health and the health records of each family were used for government purposes.

Swetcha Gora Eye Bank

VMM in collaboration with Indian Medical Association in 1988 organised awareness meetings on corneal blindness and eye donation. In 1989, Baby Swetcha Gora, daughter of Dr. Keerthi (Grand-daughter of Chennupati Vidya) died at the age of seven years and she pledged her





eyes in a meeting. Her eyes were donated to two blind people. She was the inspiration for the foundation of Swetcha Gora Eye Bank. Vasavya Mahila Mandali under the dynamic leadership of Dr.G.Samaram had educated and motivated the urban and rural people on eye donation, collected family pledge forms, documented the donor and recipient list, conducted Keratoplasty(corneal transplantation) surgeries.

This eye bank is a life member in Eye Bank Association of India and is the only eye bank successfully run by a women organization without eye hospital. Surgeries are being done with the support of Ophthalmologists of Vijayawada. Through Swetcha Gora eye bank, about 900 people got their vision. More than two lakh people pledged to donate their eyes. A mobile Van was donated by Syndicate bank to collect eyes and to disseminate knowledge on eye and eye donation in 2019.

Study of HIV testing:

VMM in collaboration with Indian Medical Association, Rotary Club of Vijayawada and Dolphin Medical Services conducted a study on the situation of HIV in Vijayawada in 1995 among sex workers, street children and automobile workers and rural and urban women and men. It was identified that nearly 25% of street children tested were HIV positive and so were automobile workers. This gave a direction to VMM to work in the field of HIV which was rapidly spreading and people were not aware of the prevention. The mortality and morbidity was just visible in late 1990s. Dr. Samaram, Dr. Meher Prasad and Dr. Deeksha formed a medical advisory team for VMM and started to plan awareness, early detection and early treatment. In those days, the cost of testing kits was high and the treatment for opportunistic infections was also costly. Anti-Retroviral Treatment was not available in the public sector. Doctors were not willing to treat the HIV positive patients and high level of stigma and discrimination was the root cause for deaths and morbidity. There was no hope for the people living with HIV and the families were lacking support from their own family and also community. Myths and misconceptions on HIV were rampant. This was a difficult task for VMM but with community involvement VMM could succeed. Then a two decade journey of VMM started in the field of HIV.

Street Children Program:

VMM identified about 36,000 children living on the streets of Vijayawada and their health was a major concern. They were exposed to unprotected sex and risks of contacting Sexually Transmitted Infections (STI) and HIV infection. These children developed adult habits like multiple partners, same sex partners, drugs, smoking and drinking. Their hygiene was poor and they had many skin infections and general health problems. After seeing the study report the Department for International Development (DFID), UK and government of Andhra Pradesh



initiated prevention of STI and HIV among street children as a pilot project in 1999. Dr. Deeksha and Dr. Meher Prasad treated STIs and identified the HIV status. Hygiene was inculcated by providing soaps, shampoos, and new clothes. Peer educator system among street children was a successful initiative. Common causes of children coming on to the streets include marital disharmony of their parents, step father/mother ill treatment at home or peer pressure. At VMM they learned leadership and management skills to better their lives. Many joined their families afterwards.

Reducing Burden of HIV and Tuberculosis and other diseases through Community based strategies.

Till 2000 VMM was working with communities in Krishna district. But in 2000 Dr. Sujith Ghosh, representing HIV/AIDS Alliance, an international NGO, visited VMM and discussed about HIV prevalence in India and the need to work with other NGOs to reach more communities. The idea of lead partner role of VMM evolved. VMM accepted to be a lead partner to six NGOs in six districts of combined state of Andhra Pradesh. Home and Community Based HIV/AIDS Care & Support (HCBS) program, supported by Abbott Fund, USA from 2000 to 2012 had made an impact on the communities through innovation and policy changes suitable for HIV in community.

Many programs evolved involving communities like KRISCHIP program on five diseases: Malaria, Filaria, TB, Leprosy and HIV. Clinton foundation program- CHAI program, for children living with HIV reached through 47 NGOs/ CBOs in the combined state of Andhra Pradesh. For happy and healthy children BALASAHYOGA program was a consortium of FHI, CARE INDIA and Clinton Foundation. CHAHA program supported by India HIV/AIDS Alliance, and Global fund round 6, with six partners reached children affected by HIV and provided nutrition and support services through linkages.

CABA project was done in Krishna district with the district administration for children affected by HIV/AIDS. All departments promoted CABA cells and special double nutrition to all HIV positive and affected children and these families were linked to all welfare schemes.

TAHA Project reached East Godavari district in few mandals on prevention of Trafficking and HIV/AIDS. Support groups were formed with collaboration of all departments of Government. This project was supported by UNDP and APSACS. A booklet developed by VMM and published by women development and child welfare department, Government of Andhra Pradesh on trafficking was released in this project.

Then to combat the Tuberculosis and HIV, TAP- Tuberculosis in AP had reached six districts in the most unreachable tribal and fishermen community and urban and rural people. Community





based care and support in urban slums of Vijayawada was done with the support of an international organization, the Catholic Relief Services .

In those days the stigma and discrimination was so high that people died of negligence and lack of support system. So the project addressed stigma and discrimination in the society by engaging communities through knowledge building by formation of support groups within the communities. It was a difficult task to make the families gather together and talk about HIV. From one to one counseling behind closed doors of their homes, the stage was reached where the positive speakers reached the whole state and boldly shared their HIV status and encouraged people to come out and take treatment and this made a significant impact.

Initially testing was not available in government hospitals, so VMM in collaboration with the manufacturers of testing kits, got the kits for lesser price and started testing the people and referred them to government hospital for treatment. Testing and treatment facilities were available only in three government hospitals and it was difficult for the sick persons to travel. Many died with lack of treatment. Testing kits were sparse and drugs were not available for all in early 2000s.

HCBCS Project was implemented through 6 partner NGOs in 4 coastal districts of Andhra Pradesh- Visakhapatnam, East Godavari, Krishna and Guntur. Community sensitization through Information Education and Communication (IEC) activities, referral to Integrated Counseling and Testing Centers (ICTC), organizing medical camps were the main activities. Identifying the HIV positive person was very difficult as the families were ashamed and did not allow NGOs to help them in getting services. This high level of stigma and self-isolation were the main reasons of high mortality. So focus was made on reducing the stigma and discrimination. NGOs were stigmatized as "AIDS PEOPLE" and were not allowed to come to their homes. In such a negative attitude towards HIV/AIDS, VMM worked with partner NGOs in the communities and became a part of their families and became a guardian for their children who were orphaned.

Treatment of Tuberculosis, the opportunistic infection in HIV which was the major cause of death was another challenge. Available services were few, adherence to treatment for 6 months was a hindrance. Multi Drug Resistance (MDR) TB, spread of TB to other family members who were HIV positive and children were major challenges for NGOs. Positive speakers and volunteers in the communities took the responsibility of TB referral and treatment adherence by becoming care givers to another HIV positive person and monitored their progress. Teachers, Anganwadi staff, family members affected by AIDS and also HIV positive persons became active volunteers within their own communities.

Support groups were formed initially with people living with HIV and later their family members





were involved and as a step up, people from the community were also became a part of the groups. Positive speakers ,people living with HIV and their family members were trained in nutrition demonstrations and disseminated knowledge on improving health through low cost nutrition.

Advocacy with health department to meet the demands of HIV in the communities was a constant activity and VMM became a bridge between government and People living with HIV. VMM is on the board of Andhra Pradesh State AIDS Control Society as NGO representative.

VMM observed that schools were not permitting children from HIV families. VMM did advocacy with government of Andhra Pradesh in getting a GO for 'No discrimination in schools'. Then school support groups were formed at schools to reduce stigma and discrimination for children affected or living with HIV and to have a support system for these children. The GO was shared in the schools and conducted sensitization meetings for teachers and parents.

The project had reached nearly 12,500 PLHIV and more than 2 lakh people from community through different IEC activities. The empowered support group members were supporting the needy people in their community. The project had built human resource from communities as lay counselors. Once they were the project beneficiaries now they are the resource persons and the change agents.

Pediatric HIV Programme

VMM identified some children from HIV families very sick and tested them. 326 children in Andhra Pradesh from HCBCS programme were tested HIV reactive. The facilities for children were sparse and Anti Retro Viral Therapy (ART) for children was not available. Adult tablets were powdered and were given to children. The children were dying fast and this issue was reported to National AIDS Control unit. Then Clinton foundation arranged a meet to discuss about the situation and VMM participated and shared the number and the urgency of the health of these children. VMM was the first Lead Organization for Clinton Foundation in India to work on Paediatric AIDS and initiated care and support for Pediatric HIV by partnering with 47 NGOs and HIV positive networks. More children were identified and the pediatric ART was supported by Clinton Foundation. Initially camps were conducted in government hospitals by VMM for testing and initiating ART. The need for adherence to ART by children was dealt with formation of **Prerana support groups** with children living with HIV and their care givers. This improved the adherence to ART. Many of the children are leading a productive life today.

It was also observed that many HIV positive children lost their parents and were living with grandparents who were old and unable to take care of their grandchildren. So **Grannies clubs** catered to their needs and these clubs were attached to nearby adult support group for help.





This improved the health of the grannies as well as children. They had larger families now in community to take care of the children.

Health on wheels

VMM reached people living with HIV at their door steps through mobile health units- "Health on Wheels"- from 2008 to 2010 with the support of Abbott fund, USA. Every day the trained team visited urban slums, screening them to identify different ailments prevalent in the area. HIV/AIDS screening was also done and the affected people were taken to the hospitals for further treatment. School and college children were educated at regular intervals through interaction with health workers. Regular treatment for opportunistic infections was provided to people living with HIV and their improved quality of life was visible. In the evenings the health on wheels organised counselings and film shows on good habits, health, TB, HIV/AIDS and Malaria. Awareness on Swine flu was taken up supporting the government and people during such emergencies. During the year 2009-2010 swine flu was spreading. VMM trained 90 multipurpose health workers and outreach staff of NGOs regarding swine flu. They were trained to bring awareness to the public about the symptoms, prevention, spread of disease, and treatment services available.

Mobile Integrated Counseling and Testing Center for HIV (MICTC)

Andhra Pradesh State AIDS Control Society started MICTC in Krishna, West Godavari, Khammam districts in 2008. The project focused on reaching the unreached areas for HIV testing. The Mobile ICTC is equipped with driver, Counselor, Lab technician and attendant. This project is supported by District AIDS Prevention Control Unit (DAPCU) and has linkage with local NGOs. The Mobile ICTC along with HIV testing educated the people on HIV/STI/TB through group meetings and video shows.

Urban Health Centers

Vasavya Mahila Mandali as Co-management agency managed Urban Health Centers with the support of Vijayawada Municipal Corporation in Vijayawada. VMM managed six urban health centers with a medical team of one Doctor, one community organizer, two auxiliary nurses and midwives and two helpers. The focus of these health centers was on maternal and child care. They provided medical treatment and counseling, antenatal checkups, immunisation, promotion of institutional deliveries, identification and referral of TB and life style diseases. Health Forums were formed at community level for every 50 households. They conducted meetings every month. They monitored the health of the people and tracking the trends of seasonal diseases. Dr. Meher Prasad and Dr. Deeksha donated medicines and equipment for these centers and tracked the disease prevalence regularly.





Apollo Tyres Health Care Center

VMM reached automobile and allied population with the support of Apollo Tyres Foundation since 2011 for providing general health, HIV/STI, Eye care, for lab tests and for providing medicines at Jawahar Autongar, Vijayawada which is the biggest autonagar in India with more than 1000 trucks that visit for repair works and for body building works. The project provides clinical services for the truckers through a membership card of INR 20 valid for 30 days at 25 different centers spread across India. The project focuses on public awareness through pamphlets, pictorial information material, street folk arts, video shows and different play way tools. The center has pharmacist for medicines distribution, medical doctor, lab technician and Project coordinator to provide these services. During 8 years of the project it has reached more than 25,000 truckers.

Community Based Rapid HIV Testing Program

VMM with AIDS Healthcare Foundation, India Cares, had done a community based pilot Rapid Testing Program of intervention in 2016 December. 1500 tests were conducted in communities and had identified 23 HIV positives which were reconfirmed with Elisa test and all were linked for treatment at public services. With this pilot project, VMM started 6 interventions in 3 districts reaching the most unreached areas. At each intervention a counselor, a Lab Technician, linkage worker and a community mobiliser were placed. Public awareness campaigns in community through small group meetings, in collaboration with the local functionaries of Health department were conducted. Organized HIV testing with the consent of clients after counseling, HIV/TB positives were linked to respective services. Treatment adherence monitoring with sensitization and educating the family members on home care and self-care was provided.

Preventing Parent to Child Transmission program (PPTCT)

This Project was supported by Infra structure & Financial Services under global fund round 4 programme. The project focused on HIV transmission prevention from HIV positive pregnant women to new born babies. VMM reached 6350 people living with HIV/AIDS since 2001, out of which 235 children were between the age group of 0-14 years, 45 children were between the age group of 15 – 18 years, Vertical transmission was around 3%. All the pregnant women were linked to government hospitals for effective utilization of services. The project worked in two revenue divisions of Krishna district. In the initial stages antenatal women with low CD4 count only were kept on ART. Now all HIV positive pregnant women are provided ARV therapy irrespective of their CD4 count. After delivery the new born baby was also provided treatment till 18 months of age.





Preventing Parent to Child Transmission by early identification, care and support of vulnerable pregnant women through frontline functionaries (ANM and ASHA workers) was supported by MAMTA-Health Institute for Mother and Child. This project was done at Adilabad District working in Six Mandals and identified 2159 pregnant women. Project focus was on improving the maternal health and to reduce HIV transmission from mother to child. All the identified pregnant women were linked to ICDS project.

Tuberculosis prevention in Andhra Pradesh (TAP)

The aim of the Project was "To reduce the levels of TB and TB/HIV co-infection and to increase access to effective health services through sensitised and empowered communities and local advocacy". This project was launched in September 2011. The coverage area under the project was 27 blocks spread across six districts of Andhra Pradesh: East Godavari, Krishna, Nellore, Prakasam, Srikakulum and Vishakhapatnam.

The outcome of the project was increased awareness of TB and HIV and increased utilization of government health services, establishing community structures, increased health seeking behaviour and improved TB diagnostic and treatment services. The main target group included tribal and fishing communities, women and children, and those living in sparsely populated areas. During the 36 months of the project period, a total of 1,65,839 (37% males and 63% females) population was directly covered. Group awareness raising activities including cultural shows, meetings, observational days such as World TB Day, World AIDS Day reached many more people. The beneficiaries reached out indirectly through mass media activities and with IEC materials like auto stickers, boat messages, charts, wall paintings, etc. During the 36 months of project period, a total 2051 new TB Cases, 652 new HIV cases and 135 new co-infection cases were found and were put on treatment. The fishermen from Srikakulam were going to Gujarat by boats and were dying there of HIV or TB and so they were stigmatized in Gujarat and so ART and ATT were provided for their stay there and a person was entrusted to monitor their adherence.

Designated Microscopic Centers (DMC)

Supported by the District TB Control Society under RNTCP programme, VMM managed 2 DMCs. Early diagnosis and early treatment initiation was done along with follow up and counseling. Thickly populated urban slums were selected and seven MDR cases were diagnosed. A lab technician provided door to door survey in slums. Tracking of family contacts was taken up. VMM tracked two families with TB where both wife and husband were TB positive. The online data generation and link with Aadhar card and message alerts to health care workers and patients for refilling and retesting of patients, improved the treatment adherence.





Safe Water, Sanitation and Housing

Women had to travel a long distance to fetch water for drinking and that water was not hygienic and many cases of diarrhea were identified along with other water borne diseases. The families were living in poorly ventilated homes and lacking toilets at home. It became a security issue for women to go to open fields for defecation. It was taken up as a rights issue to have a good home with toilet and safe drinking water as well as a health issue. So VMM focused on Housing and Sanitation and Drinking Water Projects. VMM developed a network of women organisations in the villages to initiate the housing and sanitation projects with the support of CAPART. VMM supported these gross root organisations in monitoring, accounting and procuring the raw material for construction. VMM also volunteered to support these women organisations without expecting financial aid either from them or CAPART.

Besides the surroundings becoming unhygienic, the women were subjected to insinuation and abuse when they were using fields for defecation. As a solution to this social problem, CAPART and Rastriya Mahila Kosh have entrusted the responsibility of constructing 3000 toilets in the villages from 1991 to 1998. Each toilet was constructed with 2000 rupees grant and the beneficiary was responsible for the construction and to bear any additional expenses. The scheme helped the people immensely in developing good habits. Later when VMM found that the people were not utilising the toilets after construction, an awareness campaign was undertaken to increase the utilisation of the toilets by imparting knowledge on the diseases and the security of women and children.

Safe Drinking Water Project with Defluorination of water:

VMM noted high incidence of people with arthritis in West Krishna due to high fluoride in water. In collaboration with the University of Health Sciences, Vijayawada, awareness programmes on Defluorination were conducted. Dr. KN Rao, the then Vice Chancellor of the Health University was instrumental for the success of this programme. Many local resources were utilised and information packs were distributed to all educational institutes and community at large in these areas. All the villages affected by fluoride were reached by the VMM. The issues of the people were taken to the government in different forums that lead to construction of Defluorination tanks.

Women folk were traveling long distances of 2-5 kilometers for water and this was causing insecurity and the impact of unsafe drinking water on health was visible. So installation of Bore Wells was taken up in 57 villages in collaboration with CAPART. The bore wells were handed over to Panchayat Raj department, as a sustainable strategy.





Chronicles of VMM- Useful Skills: Planned Livelihood

In 1960s, women going out and getting training in skills was not accepted owing to the social constraints on women, being confined to HOME and FAMILY. So women never had opportunity to think of having skills for livelihood and add income to family or to lead their lives on their own terms.

VMM during its adult education classes found that women had many caged skills. We identified basic skills of women in cooking. So as a first step, Vidya went to each house in Patamata Lanka, then a village abutting Vijayawada town and motivated women to come and share their cooking knowledge with others. This was the initial livelihood and skills program of VMM. During those days women did knitting at home and that skill was shared and learnt. This gave way to more programs.

VMM initiated imparting skills for women since its inception. Simple skills like tailoring, embroidery, basket weaving, Ambarcharka (hand-weaving machine) increased their self-confidence. There were no instructors; each one used to train others in the skills they know and so it was of mutual benefit and increased the trust between one another. Vidya and Mytri carried a sewing machine daily into a thatched hut creating an environment for women to share and learn. All the women present there including Vidya and Mytri were both teachers and students. The saga of women empowerment of VMM started from a small open hut with a thatched roof to the present multistoried building donated and built by the patrons of VMM.

Slowly social capital increased and these simple skills gave financial individuality in a very minute way. These initiatives were not aimed at financial gains but social and moral gains. Sharing of their problems and discussing with each other gave them ideas to deal with their lives.

The women were confident enough to take a bigger role in their families. So VMM organized loans for Miltch cattle, milk collection and retail centers and knowledge regarding milk and milk products. They repaid loans and earned respect in their families. Women, whose voices were never heard in the families, were now heard in a low tone. This further increased their confidence. The process was slow but was an important step for women empowerment of today.

VMM took another step by introducing informal cooperative system of procuring and distributing household goods among women. They bought rice, lentils and commodities in wholesale market and distributed among themselves with their savings. This increased their food security for lesser price that was well appreciated by the families. This inculcated cooperative system among women.





International Women's Year 1975 was a milestone for VMM and women's movement. To mark the year and to encourage women to be a part of it, VMM organised a three-day exhibition with the products made by women at Vijayawada. Vijayawada Municipality distributed prizes to the best products. Sri. G. P. Rao, IAS, the then Municipal officer encouraged the women's exhibition by extending financial support. Later this type of activities in the name of Mahila Utsav (Women's Festival, an exhibition of women entrepreneurs) were being organized every year for women entrepreneurs. Later on, skill development trainings were undertaken at a bigger scale with the support of government, funding agencies and corporates.

Slowly literacy increased among girls and women and their needs changed. VMM realized that more resources were needed. So the situation was analysed through needs assessment in late 70s. This became a basis for the planning of skill training. Gradually VMM gained the confidence of local, district and state administrations. They started looking to VMM for suggestions on new projects, for implementation of existing projects and for technical support. VMM became a role model for many service organizations. VMM started to act as a mother NGO for many smaller organizations.

Type writing and Short Hand Institute for ONLY girls and women was initiated by opening Vanita Type institute. In those days all type institutes were for both male and females. Because of that families were not willing to send their girls for typewriting trainings. VMM purchased type writers on loan from Andhra Bank, and repaid the loan promptly. Vanitha Type Writing Institute was initiated as a sustainable unit, as women and girls who studied 10th class were trained for a nominal fee. These skilled women appeared for government certification and got jobs in private and government sector. Later when the demand for computer skills has come, the training of women and girls was extended to skills in computers too.

Hand Composing, book binding, carpet weaving, Cane and Bamboo handicrafts, Crochet lace making, knitting trainings were given to develop skills to improve their lives. Hundreds of women were trained and they had a meaningful life.

Anganwadi Workers training, food processing, nutrition demonstration, TV Assembling, Garment Making, House Keeping in hotels, Computers, TV and Radio repairing, motor rewinding, soft toys making, drawing and painting, Arya embroidery work, mobile repairing, Kalamkari, Bathik, tie & dye and screen printing trainings were supported by government and non-Government agencies and international donors. Many women entrepreneurs were promoted after these trainings.

The tailoring started by VMM in the initial stages graduated to advanced **industrial tailoring training and Fashion Technology** now. Women are gaining expertise in modern tailoring and





gained confidence. Some of them are physically challenged and the training is modified to suit their needs.

Driving license for street youth was a special focus VMM had taken up. In late 1990s and early 2000's, getting 'Learner's License' for street children was very difficult. VMM did advocacy with government transport department as these street youth were denied license as they lack identity and address proof and guardian signature. Then Vidya, President VMM signed as their guardian and the address was given as VMM. Hundreds of street youth were trained and many of them became proud owners of vehicles. This showed a transformation in their lives: rag picker to vehicle owner / driver. They were proud to show their Driving License as an ID card. But during this life journey, even after getting a driving license they faced lot of shaming from police who teased and ridiculed them regarding their lack of parentage and a Mahila Mandali being their home address. This insensitivity among law enforcement agencies made the youth react and expressed their agony and handed over their driving licenses to Vidya. In support of these street youth, Vidya did sensitization to the police with the help of the then Commissioner of Police. They now proudly say that they are children of VMM and became change makers.

To inculcate occupational management among street youth, loans were provided to have small enterprises like food counters on streets, Rikshaw pulling by hiring rickshaws, old paper collection points and uniforms for catering boys. It encouraged VMM with the 70% repayment of loans from such a volatile group of youth. Some of these youth formed into catering - serving groups and became leaders in the community. Some became chefs and some saloon owners. Some went to other countries as drivers and manual labor and able to save money and became owners for their own small enterprises.

'Multipurpose Health Workers training institute for Female' was initiated for girls in the year 2000 and a batch of 40 girls was trained in basics of nursing for 18 months and successful students were awarded government certificates. VMM trainees were awarded many times as best nurses. Many nurses were employed in government and private sector with respectable lives and pay. Their families respect them for their work. Orphan and vulnerable children were included in this training and they became a source of economic stability for the families. Some of the trained women became staff of VMM in different capacities. Some girls from remote tribal villages of Visakhapatnam and Suryapet (Telangana state) secured government jobs in their areas.

HIV affected and people living with HIV needed livelihood support on a priority basis. It became an emergency for those families as the earning members were incapacitated or died of AIDS.





So small loans were provided to them for petty businesses like snacks/pan shops, vegetable/ fruit vending. It gave them a hope and improved their lives. Their children were provided with skills in nursing, computers, management and secretarial skills. As Andhra Pradesh had a high HIV prevalence in 2000, addressing the livelihoods of these families was a gigantic challenge for civil society and government.

In 1991, VMM felt that **women's groups** make a difference in the lives of people as seen in other countries. VMM initiated discussions with women to start Self Help Groups (SHG) for their empowerment that would be the pillar for the development of society and the nation when they stand united. So women formed into self-help groups at every village and urban slums. VMM initially started with savings and rotated the money for credit. Then got funding from Rashtriya Mahila Kosh, extended credit to start small enterprises and women experienced increased income and learnt skills as required for their enterprises. After ten years of initiation of SHGs in 2002, VMM main streamed them with Andhra Pradesh state government as government made the initiative of SHGs. Now the SHG is a significant movement in the state. Women are taught administrative procedures and linkages and networking through advocacy. District Rural Development Authority of Krishna District facilitated SHGs.

VMM during its work in reaching to young men and women in rural areas found that they require career based skills for self-employment or job placement. Hence the programs were designed to suit the changing trends such as electrical repairs, beauty care, Pickles and Spice powder making, Value addition on Mango, Value addition on Tomato, Bike repair and Advanced Training on Tailoring and many more. All these trainings were for the duration of 30 to 60 days supported by NABARD (National Bank For Agriculture & Rural Development). This resulted in the youth to engage in productive work and gain confidence. Vocational skill development with the support of HCL foundation in tailoring and embroidery, Beautician, mobile repairing, fashion technology were provided to many youth and women.

The women were succumbing to violence at home and they were facing economic hardships. VMM facilitated this with a small fund to support women in learning skills like **computers and english speaking** which helped them to have employment as computer operators, front office management in hotels, data operators in business firms, computerized accounts management etc. HCL Foundation supported for providing skills in fashion technology, beautician and mobile phone repair and provided tool kits to start self-employment immediately after training. That helped them to earn without searching for credit. AXIS Bank Foundation supported credit and knowledge for women street vendors in providing hygienic and nutrition food by improving the ways for waste management, drinking water, nutritious food etc.





Many women in rural areas were trained in tailoring and own sewing machines. But for repairs of sewing machine they were coming all the way to cities and it was a burden not only for device repairing charges but also for transport. Hence VMM partnered with **USHA International** and established **USAH SALI Schools** in various parts of Andhra Pradesh. The preliminary one-week training followed by refresher course was useful for the woman to repair their own sewing machine and as in each village one was skilled through training, that woman had additional income by repairing the sewing machines of the others in that village. The skilled woman in repairing of sewing machine was saving INR 1500 for her machine and there were additional earning from others. Currently this is being done in Krishna, Prakasam and Visakhapatnam districts of Andhra Pradesh. Besides this, the skilled women became trainers for others and these women were also certified by USHA International.

Tribal development through horticulture is identified as one of the areas to improve the livelihoods of tribal farmers. Hence VMM had undertaken Tribal Development program with the support of NABARD. 500 acres of dry land was improved through natural resource management, horticulture and water management. The tribal farmers were formed in groups and were provided knowledge and skills through various trainings. In addition to this, another 300 families were supported with non-farm sectors like miltch animals, welding units, petty shops, tailoring machines, goat and sheep rearing. This impacted tribal families to improve their livelihoods with value addition and also to develop marketing skills and they opened financial management through banking. Illiterate and ignorant farmers and their families became knowledgeable, had exposure to other farming units and marketing avenues: they learnt on inter cropping for mango, sale of fruits and vegetables at Farmers Bazaars, sale of Guava to juice manufacturing units. Women started stitching ready-made clothes by purchasing cloth in wholesale (shifted from retail buying of cloth) and selling in nearby towns. As there were no middlemen in the commercial transactions, the tribal families were able to earn more returns. A visible change was observed in the attitude, behavior and practices of tribal families.

Vasavya Mahila SHG Farmers Producer Organization (VMFPO) was established in 15th November 2016, under the Companies registration act 2013 that was supported technically and financially by NABARD. Objective of the Company: Economic and Social development of its women members on the basis of mutual help and cooperation in accordance with the organization principles by providing marketing facilities to the products produced by the members. The company promoted different types of products like Herbal products, Jute bags, Batik printed clothes, Honey, Thread jewelry and other items with a brand name of VMFPO in local market. VMM strengthened the FPO management through capacity building programmes



and support to establish direct market outlets. Two more FPOs were sanctioned for chillies, mango and vegetables.

Rural Mart is an innovative model initiated by NABARD to promote locally produced products, which are being promoted by Self Help Groups (SHG) members. The producers in the unorganized sector are not able to realize the optimum prices due to lack of negotiation power, small production, lack of market knowledge and inability to display the products at appropriate location in the showroom. VMM established "Rural Mart" with the support of NABARD. Rural Mart is an outlet to showcase the products of Vasavya Mahila Farmer Producers Company. Mart is very useful for members to display and market their products. People purchase quality items for low cost at "Rural Mart".

Products displayed in the Mart ranging from the Handloom Cloth, printed sarees, cloth with Batik, khadi and Screen printing, Embroidery material, Jute products like bags, purses, wall hangings, cloth bags, Herbal products, Pickles and traditional food items, TV top covers, Fruit and vegetable covers, Floor kundan designs, thread Jewelry, Bangles, Cooking products, Honey and other items. Rural Mart is a strong business point that emerged to make a viable proposition for the benefit of all women members.

With the support of **Axis Bank Foundation**, women and vulnerable families were supported with livelihoods like vegetable/fruit/flower vending, mobile canteens, carts, grinders. They were trained in hygiene and show casing their products. Nutritious food like sprouts, Ragi Malt and salads were provided in these canteens that attracted many.

VMM which started as skill imparting and sharing of knowledge by women is now promoting women to be entrepreneurs and achieving their goals and facing difficulties in their lives boldly.

Chronicles of VMM- Education and Knowledge Building

Mrs. Vidya faced difficulty during the initial phase of VMM due to illiteracy of women as they were unable to understand the situation of their needs and do accounting. To make their efforts multiply, **Adult education for women** was the first step of VMM in the area of education. Vidya, Mythri and Hemalatha Lavanam used to take classes in the evenings. It was started with a few and grew to hundreds of women. One woman from adult education classes was able to read the bus number and the destination point and the husband felt humiliated and attacked her with an axe. The woman reached VMM and this made VMM realize to do gender inclusive programs since then. Community participation in adult education was encouraging. From the inception, VMM had very few paid staff. All the skills and education were taught by volunteers. It was not only the reading and writing they also taught life skills. Women started



to develop skills, financial planning and thrift and credit attitude with newly found confidence. These were the first steps of the education programs of VMM.

VMM focused on **early childhood education** through **Balwadis**. Balwadis enrolled children under seven years in rural and urban slums. Children were taught good morals, healthy habits, social etiquette and behaviour through small poems, rhymes and songs. Play-way methodology in education started from Balwadis. Apart from education the children were provided with nutritious food. Regular medical checkups were done to monitor their health. Poor attendance and poor hygiene were the initial challenges and so mothers were encouraged to visit the centers to know the teacher and the good habits. Even though children were taught at Balwadi, the mothers did not accept the good habits and so children were having a dilemma to learn. After the involvement of mothers, the attendance increased and acceptance of good habits also improved. Then as a step forward, Mothers committees were formed and they were entrusted the responsibility of supervising the centers. This made the parents aware of the benefits of the project and constantly monitored the Balwadis and saw that their children got the best service through the centre. Later the Creches and Balwadis were merged in the Integrated Child Development Scheme of the Department of Women and Children Welfare, Government of Andhra Pradesh.

After the Balwadis and Creches, Anganwadi centers were started by Government of India for early childhood learning. **Anganwadis** became a center for the population with multifaceted activities for women and children. The teacher and assistants were trained in child care, preschool education, supplementary nutrition food, pregnant women and lactating mother care, adolescent girls care, communication skills, immunisation, HIV and AIDS, rights of women and children, laws and linkages. VMM was given an opportunity to train the teachers in the centers in play way method and nearly 750 Anganwadi teachers attended 18 refreshers courses conducted by VMM. Five workshops for 523 assistants were organized. The quality of services in the communities was improved after the trainings.

Non Formal Education: In 50 villages non formal education centers were established. 1250 school drop outs were benefited. The school drop outs were mainly child labor assisting their parents due to poverty. In the evenings they attended the non-formal centers and passed exams conducted by the government of Andhra Pradesh. Later many of them joined regular schools.

Street children were cheated with the paper and plastic rag they collected from roads as they did not know the basic mathematics. So non-formal education centers were started for them and basic mathematics like addition, subtraction and multiplication were taught using stones and paper cuttings as money. This made them confident and less prone for deceit.





Then came the decade of HIV where school drop outs increased. Their parents were sick or dying, there was a shift of caretakers from productive parents to non-productive grandparents or insensitive uncles and aunts. The sudden changes in family structure had a large impact on children. Then a unique program to improve the education and health of children who were poor, orphans, semi orphans, HIV infected and children from HIV affected families was started. In this program, after school supplementary nutritious food, tuition was provided. This program was named "Learning For Life". Educational support was provided to children affected and living with HIV in all districts of Andhra Pradesh through the support of Deutche Bank, Germany. Children were trained in extracurricular activities to improve their communication, leadership and life skills. The community was also educated about personal and community health and hygiene, stigma and discrimination. The children were regularly under the care of a medical team and treatment was provided at public health centers and private practitioners.

School support groups with children living with HIV and from affected families and the children from normal families were formed in schools. The children from HIV families were unable to attend school regularly as they were care givers to their parents and so the members of the support groups used to help them in home work and to explain the lessons. The children used to go to the homes of the children in these difficult situations and used to support them morally. They used to collect rice and money from the community and supported the HIV families in the time of death or severe sickness. They became role models in the community.

Children formed mock parliaments in the schools and worked for the development of their schools. They did advocacy with officials for construction of toilets, water tanks and compound wall with the help of mothers committees. Community mobilization was undertaken to help the needy children to inculcate the habit of service. The community moved together to take care of the orphan children and provided moral and economic support.

Mother's school ". It is part of a mother's duty to monitor the child's education regularly and to assist the child to cope with the competition. At a study cum recreation centre for children at Vambay colony, a relocated slum in Vijayawada, VMM conducted quiz competitions for adolescent girls and women. Some women expressed their eagerness to study. Taking this as a lead, VMM started mother's school. It started with 5 centers and grew to 100 centers across the coastal districts of Andhra Pradesh. They learned basic education needed in day to day life. Women were able to read the scrolling news on T.V, and monitor the progress cards of their children, they were able to transact on their own in self-help groups and banks. Out of 208 women of Ammabadi, 25% were people living with HIV and 35% were family members



affected by AIDS. These centers played a major role in educating the community about HIV/AIDS, nutrition, self-care and care giving. They motivated a lot of people to get tested for HIV/AIDS.

VMM education was not just literacy but to get knowledge on multiple issues needed for the families. VMM started "Capacity Building for Women in Governance" with a focus on training women in human rights, health, attitudes and services utilisation. 1575 women were trained in "Capacity building for women in governance". From 1985 till 2001 this training for women was supported by a number of service organizations like Central Board of Worker's Education, National Institute of Social Defense, Ministry of Home Affairs Government of India, Ministry of Rural Development and Ministry of Women and Child Development Government of India.

100 representatives from government and non-government organizations selected by the Ministry of Rural development, Government of India participated in these seminars and discussions. These programmes enabled these representatives to list out the vocational and employment training facilities necessary for their community. They were also trained in the administrative procedures involved in getting these courses sanctioned.

VMM started to work with a network of NGOs to increase the geographical area of operation and also to empower the smaller organisations and communities. VMM coordinated and worked with the registered cooperative organization from 1970 at the village level. They conducted a number of seminars, conferences and trainings on Rural Development.

In the year 1988 VMM had taken up the women empowerment training to the elected members of local, regional and state level bodies. The women became aware of the working of local, regional bodies, their responsibility in developing the area they were in charge of and the rights and responsibilities of people's representatives.

The methods and techniques VMM followed in this women empowerment training had gained recognition and popularity and soon a large number of service organizations supported the training.

In 1995, **CAPART and center for social welfare board selected Vasavya Mahila Mandali to train 3000 women on awareness generation Program-** Capacity Building for Women in Governance and in 2015 conducted training for women corporators elected for urban body in Vijayawada.

VMM recognized orphans in the community with extended families and some children who were left on the streets. So **Children's village** was started with 20 children with the support of Abbott fund and then later became a **urban deprived girls hostel for 100 girls** with the support of Sarva Siksha Abhyan of Government of Andhra Pradesh. These girls were provided residential





care and education at government schools.

VMM supported the **higher education of girls** and boys and many were in lucrative jobs. Some completed IIT, and some engineering. One became a doctor and many were provided with an opportunity to learn computer skills and English speaking and writing. All the girls and women were educated with life skills. Linkage with many philanthropists and trusts gave a good impact. Chennupati Seshagirirao Memorial Charitable trust constantly supports the education of girls and women.

VMM dealt with education as not only literacy but as life skills with improved communication, decision making, risk and crisis management. This improved the lives of people who were vulnerable in communities either due to inequalities or personal crisis from disease or famines. The journey of VMM in educating the communities is a continuous effort from its inception till date.

Chronicles of VMM- Human Rights are Women's Rights

VMM believes in right to express, right to take decision and right to be a productive citizen. Women were not given an opportunity to express, take decision and so were not productive enough in the society and were treated as second class citizens. They had to abide by the decisions of the men of the family and men of the society. In this situation VMM focused on working for the rights of women. As an insult to this situation, **untouchability** was prevalent on the basis of caste. There was sectarian inequalities in the society on the basis of gender, religion and caste. Some were meant to be leaders and some meant to be followers on the basis of caste. These inequalities were very difficult to address as the villages were divided vertically and horizontally like socially backward and forward castes. This mindset was hard to break.

To address this attitude of the society, **cosmopolitan lunches** were organized where each one gets one dish and everyone shares each other's food. This was a big step towards equality. There was resistance for this but VMM stood up to the discrimination and stood for Equality.

Poverty was the main concern for development of individuals as well as society. The families used to borrow money at high rates of interest for agriculture or personal needs. This increased the financial burden. So VMM initiated **Thrift and Credit** idea among women. Women used to save small amounts each month with their earnings and those who need the money most used to take that months total. This increased the confidence of women and comradeship also. Family financial planning was part of savings and this increased discipline among them. The women felt the benefits of their involvement with VMM. This thrift and credit program was replicated by other Mahila Mandals. This paved a way to have equal rights and equal





opportunities even though the financial benefit was little, this created an atmosphere of equality.

VMM developed **Family counseling center** for women by executive members, lawyers and experienced persons from the community. Many women were benefited and family reunion was successful. Mr. T.V.Purushothama Rao, advocate in Vijayawada extended his legal services to deal with the women issues for VMM. He empowered women with legal education. Counseling center is being a part of VMM activities till date and hundreds of women are getting benefit of family reunion, legal aid and livelihood options. Police and judiciary are referring cases to VMM counseling center as family reunion is high at the center.

Escalating the programs, VMM expanded the geographical area beyond Patamatalanka, a village in Krishna District, to Sugali Tribe with distinctive nomadic life style. Literacy was zero and the distinctive dressing by the women separated them from community. They were looked upon as suspicious persons and so VMM distributed sarees and blouses to them to mainstream them. Their children were admitted in nearby schools and women were taught personal hygiene and good food habits. The youth were trained in driving and other crafts and the families settled with respect. The right for education and living well in the community were franchised. This improved acceptance of the nomads and backward class people.

To break the barriers of caste, **VMM mixed all caste people in a colony** in 1970 in collaboration with the Government of Andhra Pradesh. Houses were allotted through lottery and they lived happily as a single community. Ms. Urmila Subbarao, IAS, Sub collector of Vijayawada helped VMM in achieving the goal of this colony. This was the beginning to work against the rigid caste system in an organized way.

Women were facing the problem of taking care of their children when they were working. Creche - Helping hand for working mothers was initiated successfully. This became a point for VMM to educate and change women. The mothers were educated on hygiene, nutrition, self-sustainability. So crèches took the responsibility of their children when they were working. Realizing the need of child care centers in the changing society, the social welfare board funded the project of crèches from the year 1989 to 2001. VMM maintained crèche centers for children below five years in thirteen villages. This enabled the working mothers to leave their very small babies in the safe custody of crèche and earn their living with peace and confidence. Women's right for security was realized through Crèches.

Women facing problems did not have a place to stay or discuss their problems. They used to suffer at homes and the maternal families never accepted their daughters back to their homes as it was a taboo. So women had neither a support system nor security.





VMM started shelter homes for women to protect them from such vulnerable situations as it was their right to get security and a place to stay. **Gora Abhaya Nivas**, a home for women was in place from 1985 to 1999 with the support of the Department of Women and Child welfare, Government of India. From 1999 to 2010 the home was supported by the Humanist Association of Norway.

From 2005 to 2007 The Women and Child welfare department, Human Resource Development, Government of India supported **Swaadhar project** to cater to the needs of the victims of trafficking and HIV and AIDS at Women Empowerment centre, Vemavaram village, Vijayawada Rural Mandal. From 2008 to 2010 a women shelter home was supported by the Humanist Association of Norway to reach the vulnerable women/adolescent girls in rural areas. These homes provided women immediate shelter with basic needs, psychosocial support, health care, vocational skills, legal aid, legal counseling and family reunion. Now VMM is a NGO partner to government of AP in maintaining a **rescue home for women and girls** at Vemavaram center.

VMM with the experience in sanitation programme found that the thatched houses were not withstanding fire and floods. So VMM planned to implement the **housing project** in the villages, with the support of CAPART. 1000 houses were constructed for the beneficiaries and VMM facilitated the process and with partial financial support.

Desilting of the Govindarajulu tank: This tank was the only water source for hundreds of acres of agriculture land in Vemavaram, K. Tadepalli Panchayat, Vijayawada rural Mandal. The tank was silted and water was not available for agriculture. Farmers lost crops and their economic status reduced. So VMM had taken up the task of desilting the tank and constructed bunds with the material. The mud was used for pottery and many families settled in the area.

Priyadarsini Working Women's Hostel: Women's education and working women increased and they started to stay away from their families. So they needed a secure place to stay with all facilities. Even for short term and long term trainings women needed a shelter. The then Prime Minister Mrs. Indira Gandhi suggested Chennupati Vidya to start a working women's hostel. Chennupati Seshagiri Rao, chief patron of VMM and Chennupati Vidya donated 1180 square yards of land near Benz circle for the construction of working women's hostel. The hostel was inaugurated by the then Vice President of India Sri. R.Venkat Raman. This hostel has 50 sharing or single rooms with security, nutritious food, recreation facilities and with an ambience to make them understand life through the activities that are conducted at the campus.

Street youth were not having a secured place to sleep and were tortured by the police as they





were roaming on the streets. Initially advocacy with municipal corporation for a place for their stay was done. Later advocacy with police to stop torturing the street youth was taken up through Vasavya Rehabilitation Center for Torture program. Victims of torture were treated and food and livelihood provided. An **ex-criminal settlement area from Sitanagarm**, Guntur district was adopted by VMM and they were provided loans and counseling and slowly the people changed. Their children joined in schools and the younger generation was trained to be law abiding citizens. In different national and international forums the work done by VMM was discussed and became an active member of International Rehabilitation Counsel for Torture, Denmark.

Home for Senior Citizens is organized since two and half decades for 35. It is in Gosala Village in Krishna District. Initially the home was supported by government of India. Now it is being supported by community. The home contains a coordinator cum counselor, cook and sanitary person. Many kind hearted individuals support in kind and cash. Medical aid is by VMM and Apollo hospital. Hospice care is also provided when needed. Geriatric care is the need of the hour with broken family system.

Violence against women was and is a major problem and women's rights violation is the most common occurrence in society. Many activities like cultural programmes on the laws for women, meetings in the communities with women and men with IEC material and reaching out the students of schools and colleges through **Amma project** supported by HCL foundation were undertaken.

Mahila Mitra-Community Change Makers with Police addressing Gender Based Violence:

'No Silence for Violence' is a movement with networking and support by the community and the police bringing out change in the attitudes and mind-sets at large, empowering women to be bold, confident and courageous. Mahila Mitra movement is an initiative aimed at empowering women by creating awareness and networking towards preventing and resolving violence against women and thereby bring about a change and transformation in the society. The movement was conceived by Mrs. Chennupati Vidya, Founder President VMM and Mr. Gautam Sawang IPS, Commissioner of Police, Vijayawada with Dr Bollineni Keerthi, VMM. It was launched by VMM partnering with the Vijayawada City Police in Vijayawada on 24 January, 2017 (Girl Child Day). Today VMM is the lead partner to AP Police for Mahila Mitra state wide initiative.

'Mahila Mitra Committees' were formed at all the 21 Police Station limits in Vijayawada comprising of 134 Members. Each committee mobilises and organises 'Support Groups' with a total membership of 8120 women volunteers. Trainings on counselling, laws and risk management to the support group members are being provided. This network provides safety



to the women in distress. And it is bringing significant transformation in the attitude and mind-set of the Vijayawada City Police, in making them sensitive to women's issues with empathy.

Identifying eve teasers and counseling them along with their family members gave good impact. Instead of filing cases, 7432 eve teasers are being counseled by police and VMM. There is no repeat offender (recidivism).

Counseling of women and their families is a continuous activity of VMM since inception. Disrupted families are being counseled with a success rate of 83% percent of reunion. 191 colleges and 200 schools are sensitized. In 85 Colleges Mahila Mitra Support Groups are formed. Sensitization and orientation classes on gender issues, role and responsibilities of the police held for 3500 police staff of Vijayawada City Police covering every police station. Periodical meetings and reviews are held at every Police Station along with Mahila Mitra groups at the Police Station.

Chronicles of VMM- For Safe Environment

VMM from its inception was promoting environmental friendly habits **involving tree plantation**, **bio manure pits in the backyard**, **using bio friendly pesticides** made from cow urine. From the **kitchen gardens** of early years to today's urban potted gardens, bio manure use is promoted to save Earth.

Solar power was used in tribal welfare agriculture program for pump sets and this gave benefit to the people. Awareness on safe practices in agriculture with **dung manure** gave improved yield supported by NABARD and NEDCAP.

Solar panels were installed in VMM main campus with the support of HCL foundation and the power cost was reduced. **Solar panels were installed in Old age home** as a way for Green power supported by Australian Consulate.

Movement against plastic use is an ongoing project and VMM campus was made plastic free zone and every meeting has plastic free campaign. VMM worked with the local government in reducing the plastic use in the communities.

VMM participated in **science exhibitions** every year on the theme of safe environment and reducing the plastic use and also good habits for the benefit of earth.

Organizing Earth day, Ozone day, Environment day are part of VMM activities that increased visibility to the issue by organizing competitions for children, youth and women.

The role of pollution on the health of people is taken up and the increased cancer and lung problems were discussed in communities.





VMM chronicles - Social Media Presence

VMM presented **50 success stories** on the eve of golden jubilee year through YouTube of VMM. Face book, twitter of VMM is reaching more number of people around the globe. Continuously videos are being uploaded on different topics that are useful for the communities. The technological revolution is utilized by VMM to bring awareness and knowledge building.

VMM chronicles - Volunteerism

VMM since inception is working with volunteerism and the benefit is for volunteers and the organization. Now more number of volunteers are coming from other countries and also from premium education institutes in India. VMM has Volunteer policy and it is available on the website. The volunteers are doing work and documenting the best practices.

VMM campuses

- 1. Vijayawada main campus site was donated by Mr. Chennupati Seshagiri Rao and Mrs. Chennupati Vidya and the buildings were supported by Government of India, Humanists Association of Norway, Dr.T.Subbarami Reddy, Member of Parliament and many individuals in Vijayawada. This campus has the offices of VMM, Priyadarshini Working Women's hostel, Family counselling centre, Urban deprived girls hostel, Gora Abhaya nivas and training centres.
- 2. Saraswati Gora Youth Center, Kanuru, Vijayawada was supported by Abbott fund, USA
- 3. Old age home, Gosala, site was donated by Dr. D. Vishnuvardhana Rao and family, USA.
- **4. Vasavya Rural empowerment center** at Vemavaram. The site was given by Krishna District Administration and buildings and sheds were supported by DRDA, Government of India and Mr. Chennupati Seshagiri Rao.

In 2007, UNAIDS announced that India has the third highest number of people living with HIV in the world, estimated to be between 2 million and 3.6 million. Out of India's 28 states, Andhra Pradesh is amongst the poorest and most affected by HIV/AIDS.

Since 2005, DBAF has funded assistance for several thousand children in Andhra Pradesh by providing formal education and vocational training through low cost scholarships. The project, supported by our regional partner Education Development Centre (EDC), has been implemented by Vasavya Mahila Mandali (VMM), a non-profit, non-government, development organisation working with the people in the city of Vijayawada.

In addition to education, thousands of children have received psycho-social support, HIV/AIDS prevention training and outreach via established Children's Groups. Here they have access to voluntary counselling and a testing centre.

To date, the programme has been successful in reducing stigms and discrimination towards affected children, ensuring sponsored children regularly attend classes and progress to the next year. A number of street children have flourished to pass the first year of a Bachelors degree.

Chanda

Chanda is 13 years old and lives with her HIV-positive mother and seven year old brother in Vambay Colony, Vijayawada. The death of her father in 2002 coincided with her mother being diagnosed with AIDS. As her mother was no longer well enough to earn an income for the family, Chanda was forced out of school to become a domestic housemaid, earning 30 rupee (USD0.85) a day to support her mother and her brother.

"I had lost all hope of returning to school since my family is in such a bad position, but I had to make the sacrifice to take care of my family, otherwise we would starve." Since the establishment of a Vambay Colony non-formal education centre in 2005, VMM has provided daily evening classes to over 30 students in the local area who are facing similar challenges. The centre offers classes in mathematics, science, English and other subjects taught in formal education. The children are encouraged to go back to formal school once a financial means has been found to support their families.

"My mum is on ART (anti-retroviral therapy) medication and is doing so much better now. She is back at work and I am hoping to go back to school for my eighth grade. I want to get a university degree in accounting to become a district collector and support my mum and brother."

Aparna

Aparna, aged 15, has lost her mother and is living with her two sisters, brother and HIV-positive father. She has been attending tailoring and embroidery classes. "I hope to learn tailoring and embroidery so I can work in a tailor shop and earn an income. I want to earn this income to support my family and go back to school."



Paediatric AIDS Community-based Care and Support in India

Key Highlights

- Improved HIV testing among children exposed to positive mothers from 137 to 2048 within 3 years (2006-2009) in Andhra Pradesh-piloted a model in India.
- Reduced mortality among children living with HIV from 2.08 to 0.97% within 3 years.
- 104 social safety nets increased adherence to treatment among orphan children living HIV from 30 % to 98 % within three years evident in reduced morbidity with increased CD4 levels from 230 to 679 (on ART) and 320 to 428 (not on ART).
- Scaled up from 7 sites to 22 sites in Andra Pradesh within three years.
- Evidence of child mortality among infants (below 18 months) born to HIV positive mothers led to advocacy for HIV testing through PCR.
- Increased compliance and adherence among parents living with HIV with improved treatment access behaviour.
- VMM experience in paediatric care and support were translated into development of a Paediatric Counselling module for National AIDS Control Organisation (NACO) to train counsellors in child-friendly counselling.
- Advocacy with state government led to provision of concession to travel to ART centres in public transport.

The Development Context

- The estimated number of children living with HIV and AIDS in India is 202,000 as per UNAIDS estimates. About 56,700 HIV infected children are born every year. Half of HIV positive children die undiagnosed before their second birthday as they are not tested by PCR test, which are expensive in private sector and just initiated in public health sector.
- HIV is multi folding vulnerability to poverty hence caregivers
 could not bear cost of medicines, travel and trauma due to
 morbidity and mortality of parents and reduced adherence
 levels leading to increased opportunistic infections. In 2006
 HIV prevalence among Ante natal clinic attendees in Andhra
 Pradesh was around two per cent. With the 'political will' Asia's
 first paediatric HIV and AIDS treatment initiative spearheaded
 in India by the National AIDS Control Organisation (NACO)
 with support of Clinton HIV/AIDS Initiative that provided free
 child specific dosages of lifesaving antiretroviral (ARV) drugs.
- Under-Five mortality, going by the present trend, can come down to nearly 70 per 1000 live births by 2015 against the target of 26.67 per 1000 live births. Currently the status in Andhra Pradesh state is 63.2 in 2005-06 from 91.2 in 1992-93. However, the rate of decline is more pronounced in case of male as compared to female.
- Girl children are given less care for health, nutrition and education by families in a patriarchal society in India. Due to increased morbidity among the mothers living with HIV, they cannot take care of their children. Clinton Foundation through VMM has withdrawn the support for travel, nutrition and follow-up for treatment of children that made the poverty stricken families to invest on the health of the child living with HIV

Analysis of Success Factors

What has worked and why?

- VMM outreach workers provided education, treatment and treatment adherence to community based support groups working with children living with HIV, children from HIV affected families and caregivers. This led to peer support for taking medicines and it also helped reduce stigma and discrimination.
- VMM workers accompanied orphan children and sick, caregivers to ART centre for refilling of medication and bereavement counseling. They also promoted deliveries in institutions.
- Improved adherence with culturally acceptable age specific take home messages among low literate population in resource poor setting.
- Improved nutrition food habits led to reduced opportunistic infections in addition to medication.
- Improved supply of medicines at public ART centres led to continuity in medication.
- Sensitized health care professionals who provide timely services at testing and ART centres.
- VMM with communities developed nutrition recipes book in vernacular became popular.
- VMM has developed a close link of HIV and TB treatment as the co infection is about 40-60%.

Challenges faced and overcome

- Stigma and discrimination at family and community level.
- PCR test for infants below 18 months is not available in the public sector for early identification of HIV to reduce deaths below 18 months.
- Lack of travel concessions by government for public road transport for child with caregivers.
- Intervention among children is different and rather difficult compared to the intervention methods among adults.

Key Recommendations for Scaling Up

- Multiple levels of interventions involving all key actors in HIV/AIDS care, treatment, and counseling, with emphasis on child-friendly means of communications can yield visible impact.
- National AIDS Control Organisation (NACO) needs to design child centric community-based care and support programmes to ensure continuity of adherence levels in existing five states and to scale up them across India.
- Polymerase Chain Reaction (PCR) test for children below 18 months to be available at primary health centre (PHC) level in par with the existing scale up of ICTCs in India.
- Pediatric AIDS care should be mainstreamed into reproductive health and child care (RCH) so that child benefits from other health services as well.
- Pediatric HIV testing should be integrated into the existing Integrated Child Development Scheme (ICDS) services where the mothers will be counseled for testing of their children below 5 years.
- All families should be provided with support to access Public Distribution System by availing ration cards and where eligible, Below Poverty Line (BPL) cards.
- Double nutrition provision for sick children needs to be strictly implemented through ICDS programme where the children living with HIV will get supplementary nutrition.
- Institutional deliveries need to be promoted from 53.6 per cent to above 90 per cent so that the children born to HIV positive mothers can be protected to reduce child mortality from HIV/AIDS.
- Travel concessions on public transport for people living with HIV (including children) and caregivers to travel to ART centres in Andhra Pradesh to be replicated in all states.



»Frauen in Notlagen brauchen kein Mitleid, sondern Mitgefühl«

Dr. Keerthi Bollineni im Interview mit Lydia Skrabania

Dr. Keerthi Bollineni ist die Präsidentin von Vasavya Mahila Mandali (VMM), einer gemeinnützigen säkularen Frauenorganisation im indischen Bundesstaat Andhra Pradesh. Für eine Konferenz zum Thema der nachhaltigen Entwicklungsziele der Vereinten Nationen reiste sie im Sommer 2019 zunächst nach Bonn und später auch nach Berlin, um dort in Austausch mit säkulären und Frauenrechtsorganisationen zu treten. In diesem Rahmen besuchte sie auch den Humanistischen Verband Berlin-Brandenburg. Die diesseits-Redaktion nutzte die Chance, mit Keerthi Bollineni über Frauenrechte in Indien, die Ziele ihrer Organisation und ihren persönlichen Hintergrund zu sprechen.



hre Organisation Vasavya Mahila Mandali feiert in diesem Jahr ihr 50-jähriges Jubiläum. In welchen Bereichen ist VMM aktiv?

Wir haben Programme für Frauen in insgesamt fünf Bereichen: Gesundheit und Ernährung, Qualifizierung und Existenzgrundlagen, Bildung, Menschenrechte und Umweltschutz. Wir beraten Frauen in Notlagen oder in Situationen der Veränderung, zum Beispiel bei einer Scheidung oder Verwitwung. Letztlich bieten wir Zuflucht und Unterstützung für alle Frauen, in jedem Alter und jeder Lebenslage – und auch für auch deren Kinder. Das Wichtigste ist, dass die Frauen wissen, dass sie ein Sicherheitsnetz haben, dass sie nicht auf sich allein gestellt sind. Sie brauchen kein Mitleid, sondern Mitgefühl. Wir behandeln sie mit Respekt, stärken ihr Selbstbewusstsein und ermächtigen sie, für sich selbst zu sorgen.

Wie sehen diese Programme zur Stärkung von Frauen aus?

In einem der Programme geht es vor allem darum, miteinander zu sprechen. Wichtig ist es, Frauen darin zu bestärken, selbst ihre Stimme zu erheben. Viele Frauen werden mit Gewalt konfrontiert, in ihrer Ehe, in ihrer Familie. Unser Leitspruch ist: »No silence for violence« (»Kein Schweigen zu Gewalt«). Es geht darum, den Frauen das Selbstbewusstsein dafür zu geben, ihr Schweigen zu brechen. Andernfalls werden sie noch viel größere Oualen erleben.

Ich weiß das aus eigener Erfahrung. Ich wurde im Alter von 28 Witwe, mit 36 habe ich wieder geheiratet – und in den folgenden Jahren sehr viel

Dr. Keerthi Bollineni

Dr. Keerthi Bollineni (63) stammt aus Vijayawada, Indien. Sie promovierte an der indischen Andhra University in Sozialer Arbeit und hat ein Diplom in Sozialentwicklungsstudien der kanadischen StFX University. Sie ist eine Enkelin von Gora, der das Atheistische Zentrum in Indien gründete. »Wichtig ist, dass wir auch Männer überzeugen, dass Gewalt gegenüber Frauen falsch ist. Gewalt erfahren. Erst nach sieben Jahren habe ich mein Schweigen darüber gebrochen. Aber warum hatte ich – als Pädagogin und Aktivistin – geschwiegen, hatte so lange Geduld und Toleranz für das Verhalten meines Ehemannes?

Was war denn der Grund dafür?

Es gibt in Indien kein unterstützendes System für Frauen, die solcher Gewalt ausgesetzt sind. Die Familie oder die Nachbarschaft sind keine Unterstützung, sondern sie raten den Betroffenen oft, dass diese sich fügen sollen: »Du wirst dich schon daran anpassen.« Wir versuchen ein System zu etablieren, das Frauen genau diese Unterstützung bietet.

Sie gehen sehr offen damit um, dass Sie selbst häusliche Gewalt erlebt haben.

Ich bin eine starke Person, trotzdem hat es viel Kraft gekostet, mich als Frau zu outen, die in ihrer Ehe Gewalt erfahren hat. Letztlich haben mich die vielen Frauen, die mir – stets in heimlicher Art und mit gesenkter Stimme – von ihren Problemen berichteten, dazu gebracht, offen zu sprechen. Diese Frauen glauben oft, dass sie allein mit ihrem Problem dastehen und dass jemand wie ich nicht wissen und verstehen kann, wie es ihnen geht. Wenn ich ihnen jedoch von meiner eigenen Scham, der erlebten Gewalt und dem Missbrauch erzähle, hilft ihnen das auf eine Art, Zuversicht zu schöpfen, dass sie ebenfalls wieder auf die Beine kommen können. Unsere Initiative »Mahila Mitra« unterstützt sie dabei.

Was bedeutet der Name »Mahila Mitra« und worum geht es bei der Initiative?

»Mahila« bedeutet »Frau«, »Mitra« bedeutet »Freund«. Mahila Mitra ist eine Initiative, die ein Bewusstsein dafür schafft, dass Missbrauch und Gewalt nicht normal sind – und nicht normal sein dürfen. Wir arbeiten seit Januar 2017 mit der Polizei der Stadt Vijayawada, Frauen und Männern aus



der Gemeinde sowie Bildungseinrichtungen zusammen, um gegen geschlechterbasierte Gewalt vorzugehen.

Wie genau sieht diese Zusammenarbeit aus?

Zum Beispiel wird die Polizei von uns in Gender-Sensibilität geschult. Das ist sehr wichtig, denn wenn die Mitarbeitenden der Polizei nicht geschlechtersensibel arbeiten, dann werden sich Frauen in Not nicht an sie wenden. Wir haben das große Glück, dass der Polizeipräsident, der eng mit uns zusammenarbeitet, überzeugt ist, dass die Aufgabe der Polizei nicht nur darin besteht, Verbrechen aufzuklären, sondern auch Prävention zu

Das ist essenziell, denn in Indien gibt es ein enormes Problem bezüglich sexueller Gewalt und Belästigung gegenüber Frauen, vor allem junge Männer werden zu Tätern. Wenn nun die Polizei junge Männer, oft Jugendliche, auf den Straßen aufgreift, die Frauen belästigen, dann werden diese zu unserer Organisation gebracht. Unser Gedanke dahinter ist, sie nicht zu bestrafen, sondern sie vielmehr zu reformieren, zu transformieren.

Und wie kann so eine Transformation gelingen?

Wir sprechen mit den jungen Männern, in Einzelberatungen und in der Gruppe, vermitteln ihnen Werte, fragen danach, was zu ihrem Verhalten geführt hat. Wir sprechen aber auch mit ihnen über ihre eigenen Ziele im Leben und wie sie diese erreichen können. Wir sind sehr erfolgreich damit: Seit dem Start der Initiative gab es etwa 4.000 solcher Beratungen – und keine Wiederholungstäter.

lich nicht, ein Bewusstsein und eine Politik zu entwickeln, die diesen Veränderungen gerecht werden und einen Wandel herbeiführen hinsichtlich der festgefahrenen Einstellungen und Denkweisen des Patriarchats. Und das führt zum Konflikt.

Was braucht es, um diesen Konflikt zu lösen?

Wir müssen Möglichkeiten schaffen, um Frauen zu ermächtigen – wirtschaftlich, sozial und politisch. Aber, und das ist sehr wichtig: Wenn wir von der Ermächtigung von Frauen sprechen, müssen wir immer auch die Jungen und Männer mit einbeziehen.

"Women in need do not need pity, but compassion"

Dr. Keerthi Bollineni is the President of Vasavya Mahila Mandali (VMM), a secular not-for-profit organization dedicated to building a more sustainable civil society in India. In the interview, the activist talks about women's rights in India, the domestic violence that she has experienced and how sustainable social transformation can succeed in India.

Vasavya Mahila Mandali (VMM) was founded in 1969 as a secular not-for-profit organization in the Indian state of Andhra Pradesh, where it supports women, children and families in difficult situations and enables them to help themselves. The organization's vision is to build a more sustainable civil society in India.

For a conference on the topic of the United Nations' sustainable development goals, Keerthi Bollineni first traveled to Bonn in the summer of 2019 and later also to Berlin to exchange ideas with secular and women's rights organizations. In this context, she also visited the Humanistic Association Berlin-Brandenburg. The editors from this side took the opportunity to talk to Keerthi Bollineni about women's rights in India, the goals of her organization and her personal background.

Dr. Keerthi, your organization Vasavya Mahila Mandali is celebrating its 50th anniversary this year. In which areas is VMM active?

We have programs for women in a total of five areas: health and nutrition, qualifications and livelihoods, education, human rights and environmental protection. We advise women in emergencies or in situations of change, for example in the event of a divorce or widowhood. Ultimately, we offer refuge and support for all women, of all ages and situations - and also for their children.

The most important thing is that women know that they have a safety net, that they are not on their own. You don't need pity, you need compassion. We treat them with respect, strengthen their self-confidence and empower them to take care of themselves.

What are these programs to empower women like?

One of the programs is all about talking to each other. It is important to empower women to speak out themselves. Many women face violence, in their marriage, in their family. Our motto is: "No silence for violence". It is about giving women the confidence to break their silence. Otherwise, you will experience much greater agony.

I know that from my own experience. I became a widow at the age of 28, remarried when I was 36 - and experienced a lot of violence in the years that followed. It was only after seven years that I broke my silence about it. But why had I - as an educator and activist - been silent, had patience and tolerance for my husband's behavior for so long?

What was the reason for that?

There is no support system in India for women who are exposed to such violence. The family or the neighborhood are not support, but they often advise those affected that they should obey: "You will adapt to it."

We are trying to establish a system that offers women exactly this support.

You are very open about the fact that you have experienced domestic violence yourself.

I am a strong person, but it took a lot of strength to come out as a woman who experienced violence in her marriage. Ultimately, the many women who told me about their problems - always in a secret manner and with a lowered voice - made me speak openly. These women often believe that they are alone with their problem and that someone like me cannot know and understand how they are doing. However, if I tell them about my own shame, the violence I have experienced and the abuse, it helps them to gain confidence that they can also get back on their feet. Our "Mahila Mitra" initiative supports you in this.

What does the name "Mahila Mitra" mean and what is the initiative about?

Mahila means woman, Mitra means friend. "Mahila Mitra" is an initiative that creates awareness that abuse and violence are not normal - and must not be normal. We have been working with Vijayawada City Police, community women and men, and educational institutions since January 2017 to address gender-based violence.

What exactly does this collaboration look like?

For example, we train the police in gender sensitivity. This is very important, because if the police officers are not gender-sensitive, women in need will not turn to them. We are very lucky that the police chief, who works closely with us, is convinced that the task of the police is not only to solve crimes, but also to do prevention. This is essential, because in India there is an enormous problem regarding sexual violence and harassment against women, especially young men who are perpetrators. Now when the police pick up young men, often young people, on the streets who harass women, they are brought to our organization. Our idea is not to punish them, but rather to reform them,

And how can such a transformation succeed?

We talk to the young men, in individual counseling sessions and in a group, impart values to them, ask what led to their behavior. We also talk to them about their own goals in life and how they can achieve them. We are very successful with this: There have been around 4,000 such consultations since the initiative was launched - and no repeat offenders.

My Sweet Memories of the Beginning Days of VMM

In early 1960s, Vasavya Srothala Sangham (All India Radio (AIR) Listener's Club) was started with encouragement from Akashvani (AIR) Vijayawada, implementing the Gora's 'VASAVYA' – 'VA' means Vasthavikatha (Reality), 'SA' means Sanghadrushti (social outlook), 'VYA' means Vyakthithvam (Individuality). This endeavour opened doors to many women programmes on Akashvani (AIR). This was the foundation to further activities like Vasavya Mahila Mandali (VMM) in 1969. This organisation committed to the cause of women was led by Smt. Chennupati¹ 'Vidya as President, Mrs Lakshmi Chari as Secretary, Smt. J. Mythri as Treasurer along with the support from Dr. Y. Sitaratnam, Smt. Hemalatha Lavanam, Smt Manemma and others from Vijayawada.

As a teenager, I remember that many like me were influenced by VMM and were encouraged to actively participate in the various women programmes on Akashvani which promoted awareness on health, nutrition, girl child education, and women empowerment. Quiz programmes for women conducted by Akashvani were thrilling experience. As I write this article, I am re-living the moments of quizzing. Our team was with teenagers whereas our competitors were of our mother's age and most of them representing Bharatha Mahila Mandali. Those Akashvani quiz programmes were joyous with healthy competition and as well promoted women education, self-confidence, and self-respect. Still fresh in my mind, Akashvani organised exhibition for every Sankranthi under the dynamic leadership of women programme producer, Smt Syam Sundari with the help from VMM and inmates of Government Short Stay Home for Women. For this event all of us came together to make arrangements like cleaning the premises, decoration of the area with flowers and *rangoli*, arranging tables and chairs for exhibiting products made by women. These events encouraged women to promote their home-made products and also inculcated dignity of labour, and team work.

Sri Chennupati Seshagiri Rao was a strong pillar of support to VMM. He being a strong believer of equality of men and women, personally encouraged all the members of VMM to attend and participate in the meetings and competitions held at Ram Mohan Library, Hanumantharaya Grandhalayam, Sarvothama Bhavan, and other places. He personally accompanied us and had taken utmost care in protecting us. He organised excursions and picnics free of cost with an intention to educate the members of VMM in different fields.

In 1975, in connection with the International Women's Year, a mega event was organised by Department of Women Welfare, Government of Andhra Pradesh along with all women organisations in Vijayawada. Smt. Ch. Vidya of VMM played a pivotal role in organising many competitions and cultural programmes for women. As a part of it, it was a challenging move by VMM to encourage and bring the native tribal Lambada women outside their *tandas* (hamlets) to Vijayawada to participate in the programmes and also perform their traditional Lambada

dance. Irrespective of all the hurdles, this brave step acted as a confidence booster for those women who participated, the communities, and the VMM to foster its work towards women empowerment.

VMM was registered in 1979 and extended its range of programmes in many aspects. Vocational training programmes were initiated for the tribal women especially lambadas and other downtrodden women. The specialty of the programme was that the women were trained not only in tailoring but also taught basic maths, reading and writing in Telugu, and educated about nutrition and hygiene. Additionally, the women were made aware about blind-beliefs and superstitions. This caused uneasiness in men, who themselves were illiterate. They could not accept this change in the women status. So, to bring change in the society as a whole, VMM started Adult Education Programmes for men in their localities. To promote equality in the society, VMM organised cosmopolitan lunches, buffet parties in the downtrodden and tribal colonies.

Smt. Ch. Vidya and Smt. J. Mythri personally counselled the women with different social problems. Some women were given shelter within the premises. Along with continuous counselling women were given vocational trainings like hand-composing and binding, block printing, tie and dye, and nursing. Experts were invited from Nutrition Department, Hyderabad to educate these women about various food preparations with high nutrition value. They gave training in making of nutritious jams, jellies, pickles, and biscuits. As an initiative, a deserted woman was encouraged to start a small canteen in the premises of hospital which was inaugurated by then sub-collector Ms Urmila. Overall, the women were counselled to become self-confident and bold enough to settle in life with new hope. They are also skilled enough to have financial independence.

In 1985, VMM started Gora Abhay Nivas, a short stay home for women with social problems. The women were counselled, given vocational training and encouraged to participate in different programmes organised by VMM and Nasthika Kendram. All the visitors across India and globe visiting the centre interacted with these women and educated them about various cultures and traditions prevailing in different parts of the world, the problems women face and how they are tackled. This kind of exposure broadened the outlook of the women and gave the courage and conviction to come out of the social crisis and lead a better life.

In all these endeavours, Smt. Saraswathi Gora, the co-founder, freedom fighter, social reformer played a critical role in inspiring the women of different training programmes and inmates of Gora Abhay Nivas in many ways. Her life inspired many co-workers and associates of VMM.

Today, VMM activities have grown many folds. The commitment to secular social work, as years passed on, has extended its helping hands in various fields. On the occasion of 50 years of VMM, I feel privileged and contended to be associated with VMM since its inception. Initially, as a teenager active member and later on as a counsellor, my journey over these 50 years is indeed a rich experience, which I will cherish forever.



Composing an Ethnography of VMM Reflections of an Anthropology Graduate Student

Myname is MeghanaVagwala. I am a Marshall Scholar currently studying in the United Kingdom. I recently received my MastersDegree in Medical Anthropology (with Distinction) from the University of Edinburgh. For my thesis project, over the course of two months I worked with the women of Vasavya Mahila Mandali (VMM). VMM's four main buildings house a low-cost hostel for women, an orphanage for young girls, a shelter for women in crisis, and the office spaces where the researchers and administrators work. The outdoor courtyard is canopied by trees and a steady stream of clients wait on benches for their appointments at the family counselling clinic. Rooted in the daily life of this campus, my dissertation explored the ways in which survivors' personal lives break apart and are reassembled through the distress and professional care that often follow gender violence.

This study is based on understanding survivors' narratives in relation to their subjective post-violence experiences and their intersubjective experiences of interacting with VMM's staff people (social workers and psychologists), affiliated professionals (physicians and police officers), and Mahila Mitras (lay peer counsellors, lit. "Friends to Women"). It considers how social suffering is felt in mindful bodies and how it is expressed through various types of idioms of distress. It recognizes a gap between the kinds of care survivors may desire and what is available to them. The research questions that guided my dissertation were:

- 1) How do victim-survivors experience and express psychological distress and social suffering?
- 2) What logics do actors of care use to respond to this distress and suffering?

To answer these questions, I used the classic anthropological method of participant observation of VMM's activities: daily family counselling, on-goings in the NGO president's office, and trainings for the Mahila Mitras. The family counselling clinic provided both an intimate window into women's narratives as well as men's (and their kin's) contestation of these narratives. A family's engagement with the clinic was considered concluded when both parties wrote and signed testimonies of compromise. Though these documents were not legally binding, they were taken seriously and were sometimes shared with police officers involved in the case.

Key informant interviews were conducted with survivors (n=4) as well as those who were engaged in networks of care for victim-survivors: VMM staff members (n=3), peer lay counsellors known as Mahila Mitras (literally, "Friends to Women") (n=6), and police officers (n=4). I also conducted interviews with one psychiatrist and one lawyer, both of whom often worked with survivors referred to them by VMM.

Outside of clinic hours, I spent many a lunch hour chatting with Dr. Keerthi, the organization's president. As the days passed, we grew close and I admired the extent to which she has dedicated her daily life to VMM's success. Even as I left Vijayawada for the UK after my two months of fieldwork, it was my bond with Aunty that led me to stay on as a Technical Advisor for VMM. I look forward to the day when I can return, and in the meanwhile, send my delight and best wishes for the 50th Anniversary Celebrations.

Medical Doctor and Kuchipudi dancer



"Viswa Santhi" is about War and Peace. It delivers a significant message for the establishment of world peace and support to anti-war movement.

"Samatha Jyothi", "Saptaswaralu", "Samaikya Bharathi", Priya Bharathi" signify the national integration based on Unity in Diversity, enlightening the fact that there is need for secularism and formation of global family beyond religion, caste, creed, race, colour or regions.

"Arogya Jyothi" creates awareness on the need of Immunisation against the dreadful childhood diseases like Polio, Diphtheria, Whooping Cough, Tetanus, Measles, Mumps.

"Prakruthi – Vikruthi" on Environment, which highlights the aspects of hazards due to pollution, deforestation, nuclear weapons, and also creating awareness on how people must protect environment and nature in order to live safely and survive using the technology with responsibility and social concern.

"Thirugubatu" (Revolt). This dance drama is about the revolt against Jogini system. In some areas of India, still the inhuman custom of Jogini prevails. The dalit girls who hail from the lower rung of the social ladder are supposed to be wedded to god. Their sexual exploitation goes unabated in the garb of divine sanction. We highlighted the aspects of the brutal social exploitation of the helpless Jogini, social revolution is needed to bring self-respect, self-dignity as a human being, and also clearly depicted that she herself should build up a new personality with self-confidence and self-consciousness.

"Mamata Varshini" promotes the importance of girl child. Negligence and hatred for girl child is a social and human problem. I have discovered the importance of setting a good example to those who trust me. I have learned how to be responsible to the younger kids who looked up to me. Above all, I have become a better human being, to set a good example for the kids to follow, to lead them towards a better version of themselves.

One of my first tasks when I joined TB Alert as the International Programme Director was to manage the Department for International Development funded "Improved access to TB services for underserved communities in AndhraPradesh" project that was launched in September 2011. The project covered six districts of then Andhra Pradesh and aimed to reduce levels of TBand TB/HIV co-infection, and increase access to effective health services. The key populations that the project worked with included tribal and fishing communities, people living with HIV, womenand children, and remote communities with difficult access to health services. The project was implemented by six local non-governmental organisations and coordinated by VMM.

I first met Vidyaji during my first visit to the project in 2013 and I was immediately impressed by her resolve, her dedication and her commitment to protecting the rights of women and girls in difficult circumstances. Behind her gentle demeanour, I could see the years of selfless sacrifice and hard work she had put in to fight for social causes and ensuring that society is fair and just to all, no matter what gender, caste or religion. She was a mother to all the girls and women under the umbrella of Vasavya Mahila Mandali as well as their strength. Under her leadership, and the effort put in by VMM and the other partner NGOs, the project identified 2051 people with Tuberculosis, 652 people living with HIV and 135 people who were co-infected with both TB and HIV reaching 1,65,839 men and women or around 12% of the total population of project area with key information on both TB and HIV.

Vidyaji was one of the key founders of VMM in 1969. From a humble start led by women during times when women were not a priority in health and education, the organization has grown into a reputable, trusted and award winning organization that works on education, health, social justice, livelihoods and environment. Sadly, Vidyaji passed away but her strong legacy continues through the work of her daughters – DrKeerthi, MrsRashmi and DrDeeksha, as well as the thousands of people, especially women and girls, whose lives have been touched positively by VMM over the past 50 years!


